It is therefore my vision, for the National Convocation to work in collaboration with the new Administrative Secretary/Associate General Minister to identify within our congregations, and among church leaders, how we might empower them to disrupt and dismantle white supremacy culture. Specifically, what do congregational leaders need by way of support and training in order to grow in an understanding of the Black Lives Matter Movement and its implications for the African American Disciples Church in order to disrupt and dismantle the sin of white supremacy.
